Virtual Court Kiosks

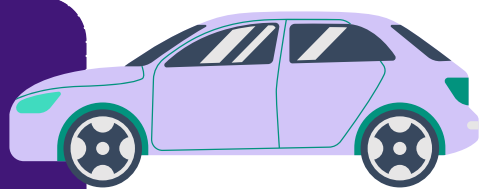
For people who don't have a computer or stable internet connection, you can put kiosks in public places, like libraries, where people can attend court virtually. Kiosks should be designed to protect privacy.
